Many people have grown up knowing One For Sorrow, Two For Joy, the popular magpie nursery rhyme where the number of birds seen at any one time will determine whether you have bad luck or good luck.

Probably the most well-known version recited is as follows:

One for sorrow,
Two for joy,
Three for a girl,
Four for a boy,
Five for silver,
Six for gold,
Seven for a secret,
Never to be told.

Unfortunately, earlier this month up to 10 magpies were found deceased in Davistown both in the garden of The Little Teapot and out the front of The Real Estate Agency.

I have lived in the 3 Villages Community for around 4 years (my partner for around 12 years) and have been delighted by the level of acceptance by the locals.

There's a real sense of community here.

I am owner/director of several businesses but Cockle Channel Creatives is a brand new venture. It's not so much a business as an expression of who I am...a poet, philosopher and guide.

After speaking to the owner of The Little Teapot; Helen reported finding several deceased magpies in the cafe backyard over a period of days.

Helen reported the unusual deaths to the local ranger who collected one of the dead birds and liaised with the Environmental Protection Agency to both report the spate of deaths and to seek an autopsy on the bird to find the cause of death. Unfortunately, due to cost no autopsy was undertaken, however, it is believed the birds were poisoned.

Subsequently the EPA undertook a letter box drop to residents in the area reminding everyone that there is a fine of up to \$120,000 for deliberately killing a magpie.

We do however understand that rogue magpies do pose a threat when swooping and as spring approaches encourage you to report your concerns to Council Rangers.

And of course we love our garden, writing poetry, painting, singing but our great passion is travelling to the wild places (here and around the globe), trekking, camping and living with locals. Nietzsche talked of travel as "expanding our concept of man and making it more beautiful" and Wallace Stegner described the wild places "as a part of our geography of hope"...these two ideals drive my travelling.

Something that people may not know about me...I am the only person who has ever done the Smallest to Tallest trek. I climbed the smallest registered mountain in the world, Mt. What a great day we had at **Brisbania Public** School celebrating NAIDOC week! Students from Kindergarten to Year 6 enjoyed learning about Aboriginal traditions, customs and what NAIDOC week

is all about. Highlights of the day included creating a whale out of natural resources, the girls learning about traditional Aboriginal dance while the boys had a go at learning the didgeridoo, students also had the opportunity to taste test damper, crocodile, kangaroo and emu sausages (crocodile were the favourite) and play some traditional Aboriginal games.

Here are some student testimonies:

My favourite activity was GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP! We learnt about the meaning and watched a video of a lady (Ryhia Dank, a young Gudanji/Wakaja artist from the NT) who won \$10,000 for standing up for her family. The meaning of GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP! Is to encourage all people to stand up for themselves and the Aboriginals. Cheyenne

One of the traditional games we learnt about was touch football (Buroinjin), but you can pass the ball (traditionally made from kangaroo skin) in any direction and you don't have to place the ball on the try line – you only need to run over it. Ainsley On NAIDOC Day we were shown how to weave the traditional way. We weaved bracelets together with wool in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander colours. Mia

#### **HERITAGE**

#### A Serious Sirius Bicentennial Exhibition.

Broken Bay had been identified by Cook in 1770 and so it was that only six weeks after the First Fleet dropped anchor at Sydney Cove that Governor Arthur Phillip came to the place, in cutter and longboat from HMS Sirius. Phillip was desperately searching for furtile farmland, the soils at Botany Bay proving of far less quality than described by Cook eighteen years earlier and those at Port Jackson were little better.

The first area explored by Phillip on his Broken Bay exploration, he named the North East Arm, an extensive waterway,11kms long and 7km wide, featuring numerous broad-waters, bays and inlets. While only 35 kms by sea, north from Sydney Heads it was, however, over thirty years before European settlement took place. Because of a Penal settlement established at Newcastle. Government policy was to maintain only bush between those intent on escape and the Hawkesbury River.

With the Newcastle Prison closed and the North East Arm renamed Brisbane Water after then Governor. James Webb became first settler, documented in 1823. This makes next year, 2023, our Bicentennial of European occupation. Plans for events are being supported by 4Hresearch, the 3 Villages Community Group, our local Rotary Club, Central Coast Model Makers Mens Shed, Sydeny Model Shipbuilders Club, Council and our elected members have also been asked for support.

To mark Phillips exploration of Brisbane Water, Yattalunga based NFP, 4HResearch is building models of the Sirius Long Boat also a sectional model and a full model of HMS Sirius itself, the first two models are already completed and will be previewed at the Putt-Putt Regatta and Wooden Boat Festival 30 Oct. 2022





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
