

### PROJECT REPORT

"KIDS ART" UPDATE Last month we spoke about the children's art gallery, and about the opportunity for them to create beautiful works of art from sunsets to sea creatures. and scenes, themes and ideas from within the 3 villages. There were two separate projects for the kids to work on, one being the new water bottle refill station at Jirramba Playground and the other being Bin Art. It's pleasing to report that both projects will be installed for the whole community to see in the 2nd week of September. The bin art being on the aluminium council bins at Pirate Park Playground in Davistown, using the same vinyl wrap style art that can be seen on the bins at Saratoga boat ramp picnic reserve. ### THE BELLS AND WHISTLES

Many of you may have heard or perhaps seen the seal in Brisbane Waters, keeping many people, fortunate enough to see it, well entertained.

Most recently, the seal decided to get up close and personal with a couple of kayakers. Bernie Nichols was out in her new kayak and was with Jennifer Hartich when with some delight the seal appeared near the pair while they were paddling at Davistown. They were so surprised, and you can see Bernie scrambling to get her camera working on her phone. Bernie says "We were so delighted and excited. It was just lazing on its side totally unafraid of us. We floated with it for about fifteen minutes. It was an experience of a lifetime."

Last year, a seal was spotted from June through to August. It's thought that this may be the same one visiting now, seeming to be alone but having lots of fun, so playful and curious with the locals and swimming all around Brisbane Waters.

After reading a variety of comments on Facebook, the seal has had several names such as Barnaby, Flipper, Sammy and Ziggy suggested. The most interesting one I found was from Daniel Rond, Ferry Driver, suggesting Jila Bunji (Aboriginal for water friend).

# Fact time:

There are 35 species of seals, all of whom belong to the Order Pinnipedia which is divided into three general families: fur seals and sea lions; walruses; and 'true' seals. The differences between the seals depends primarily on whether they have external ears, how well they move around on land and whether they have a thick or thin coat. Some seals can walk on land whilst others

shuffle or slide around. Our visiting seal has been identified by ORRCA as an Aussie Fur Seal.

They are warmblooded mammals, living primarily in water, resting on land, giving birth to their pups on land and shed their skin on land yearly. Seals generally eat

octopus, squid, shellfish, cod, herring, flounder, salmon, mackerel

If you ever see their belly, a female will have no obvious openings

# **HERITAGE**

Well known local advocate for the preservation and presentation of our heritage, as well as contributor to our monthly Heritage and Environment page, Peter Rea, has been presented with a Paul Harris Fellowship by Rotary District 9685 Governor Lindsay May OAM. This

Award is one of the highest honours Rotary International can bestow upon an individual. Recipients are Rotarians and Community members in recognition of their outstanding contributions. exemplifying the highest ideal in Rotary, 'Service Above Self'.

At the same time Peter was

also honoured with the Rotary Club of Kincumber's 'Look Beyond Yourself' Award - which recognises his commitment to Club community projects. Peter received these recognitions for his co-ordination of the Club's signature event, the 4 Villages-Shipbuilders' Heritage Walk, as a clear demonstration of his commitment.

In 2017 the 4 Villages Walk attracted only a handful of participants resulting in cancellation in 2018. Peter then offered to Chair a committee for 2019 and Rotary threw their full support behind this, a distinct heritage theme was been adopted, historical displays were introduced along the route, these being linked to prizes available with a history Q & A Card provided with each '4 Villages Passport'. A Covid cancellation in 2020 provided an opportunity to strengthen the concept by constructing a number of high quality historical displays and also build on community/business connections. This plus additional attractions like, selected specialty and food stalls, classic cars, history boat tours, local schools presentations etc. has witnessed the event quickly grow to attracting over 3,000 people this year.

Already a recipient of a number of State and Local Government Awards, Peter acknowledges how important recognition of this local project is. He added it was only possible, because of the support of his wife Dora and of so many Rotarians, plus various individuals, business, clubs, societies, groups, etc, including the 3 Villages Community Group.



All involved are confident that the 4 Villages - Shipbuilders' Heritage Walk will continue to grow as a unique history and heritage celebration reflecting a pride in our area.



As there is little happening at Brisbania these days, here is something from yesterday...

Before the establishment of the school, pupils travelled from Saratoga by ferry to Woy Woy

wharf and walked from there to school. Davistown children rowed across Cockle Creek to Empire Bay and walked to school. Because of this, the community sought to have their own school and Pat Bourke donated the present site to the Department of Education.

On 16 Sept. 1941, a one room school was opened with 11 boys and 11 girls aged between 6-13 years with Mr. G Walker as teacher. As a long dry was experienced after the school and its water tank were built, the pupils had to carry a water bottle to school each day. In 1947 Alan Davis was contracted to supply £70 (\$140) of materials for a 20 X 10 feet shelter shed and in Oct. another £28 (\$56) was spent on an addition to it.

The school remained a one teacher school until 1950, when Mr E. Malcolm and Mr W. Ford were appointed to their positions. Mr W. Ford conducted classes, for the Infants in the shelter shed till the second building was completed.

Gradually the school built up to five classrooms and teachers by 1969, more land was acquired and a double classroom, toilets, shelter area and administration block were opened in 1973. Portable buildings were added over time until in 1988 an eagerly awaited new School Building concept, comprising of a Library, Food Service Unit, Hall and ten classrooms.
