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PROJECT REPORT

Pippi Point Dog Park Victory

Many congratulations to the whole team led by Johnny Row in the protest against Central Coast Council wanting to close Pippi Point off-leash dog park. It took over three years. While it is great to have won the cause, users should be mindful that there are also ON-LEASH areas along Illoura Waters to access Pippi Point. Dog owners - please stay respectful to laws so this scenario can never come up again.

Here is a (shortened) extract of Johnny's speech to Council on 23 July 2024.

"The petition ... to keep the off leash exactly as it is had 3572 signatures. It is very clear what the people want.

... After a concerted effort from the 3 Villages locals we managed to raise \$3904 to pay for the Keystone Ecological Report ... [which states]:

"The presence of the important species now – after 40 years of almost uninterrupted use of the Pippi Point on a formal basis as Off-leash Area (OLA) – suggest that no significant impacts have manifested. Therefore, continued use of the Pippi Point OLA is also unlikely to manifest in significant adverse impacts.

...This conclusion ... is also based on a set of impact assessments. These assessments, pursuant to the requirements under NSW and Commonwealth legislation

determine that a significant adverse impact is unlikely to arise from the continued use of the Pippi Point OLA."

... We urge you to make your decision tonight based on what the people want, what the ecological evidence supports, in the interest of saving money and in line with the legislation. We urge you to make no changes to the Davistown, Illoura Waters dog park and not spend any more rate payers' money on environmental studies into this area.

The off-leash area at Pippi Point serves the community not just as a dog park but as an outdoor community centre which is the backbone of our little suburb."

What to Look for in a Councillor

Council under Administration comes to an end in September in the Central Coast LGA, and on 14 September you will be voting for your new representatives. I recently attended a meeting about what being a Councillor entailed, which made me think about the hard and very important role these representatives will be undertaking.

I'd therefore like to share my views on what we should be looking for in a Councillor, and not just ticking boxes for people whose names we may or may not know. So here are a few to think about.

Councillors must be able to:

- · Work cooperatively as a team on all Council decisions.
- · Understand clearly the finances of Council.
- Take a "Helicopter View" of issues, seeing the benefits to the whole of the Central Coast, while keeping in mind the residents they represent.
- Debate issues in a considered manner. Not everyone will share the same views, and it is for the Councillor to understand other's point of view.
- Understand decisions are made on a majority basis, and Councillors must be able to accept these.
- Accept that many decisions made by Council under Administration while not popular were done for good reason at the time, and cannot be overturned.



- Work cooperatively with the CEO and Executive Team, the Council makes the decisions, but this team is tasked with implementing those decisions.
- Understand many infrastructure issues take many years to complete, therefore the first term will see the fruition of many decisions made by the Council under Administration. A second 4 year term would be necessary to see many of the new decisions finalised. That is an 8 Year commitment in all.
- Accept that those nominating for Council on a one ticket issue may not be able to get concensus on that issue, and would need to adhere to the decisions of the Council as a whole, so no bad blood should be carried forward after a decision is made.

I'd ask you to think about these things, and carefully consider where the tick goes on 14 September, those elected will be our representatives for 4 years, and making important decisions for the future of our area and the whole Central Coast.

Marine Rescue NSW

Saving lives at sea and on our waterways

David Golding is a Saratoga resident and wrote about Marine Rescue NSW on the 3 Villages Facebook page recently. I thought his story was worth sharing here.

"As a raw newbie who only moved to Saratoga 14 months ago for a sea-change retirement, I saw a brave ideal in Marine Rescue's words, 'Provision of a world class rescue service to prevent injury and death on NSW waterways'," says David. "At age 68 and having finished full time work, I realised that retirement is what you make it, and what greater way to give back to the local community than by volunteering and helping save lives on the water. The dedication and mateship at Marine Rescue is phenomenal, with volunteers from all walks of life who are most respectful, professional and friendly." David has started as a Marine Rescue NSW Central Coast trainee radio operator and laughs as he says, "They tell me I have a great face for radio!"

To help boaties, there's a Marine Rescue app that can track a GPS position every 20 minutes as long as your device is switched on — "location-on" — and in mobile signal range. If there's an emergency or you've broken down, you can contact Marine Rescue through the app. You can also log in with a finishing time and destination and, if you go past that time, an alert is raised. Marine Rescue attempts to call you, and if there's no response, dispatches a rescue boat to your GPS coordinates.

Surprisingly, Brisbane Water can get very rough, very unexpectedly. Users of the Marine Rescue app should include all who use our waterways from small and large powerboat owners, bbq and houseboats users, yachties, kayakers, rock anglers and surfers. William IV

A few weeks ago I went to Newcastle Harbour to see a replica of the old steamship *William IV*, which was launched by Hazel Hawke for the Australian Bicentenary. I made the trip with two mates: Bill Bollard and Bob Hornby. Bill was a Naval Architect who produced drawings of some Brisbane Water ships so I could have scale models made, Bob gained his second engineer's ticket with Blue Funnel Lines before emigrating to Australia and taking up land based engineering employment. On leaving school before I pursued a career in graphics, an apprenticeship took me to engine rooms of luxury yachts to fishing boats, merchant ships to warships like the *HMAS Vampire* now at the National Maritime Museum in Darling Harbour.

The original *William IV* was a side paddle wheeler and the first steamship ever built in Australia, constructed 100 km north of Gosford at Clarence Town on the Williams River, a tributary of the Hunter River. From 1831, the ship worked for 30 years along the Australian east coast. The ship's speed made the newspapers, taking 10 hours to cover the 140 km from Newcastle to Sydney and four days for the 620 km round trip to Port Macquarie. In 1839, the ship made its first trip to Brisbane Water and the next year was acquired by the Brisbane Water Steam Packet Co., mooring at the East Gosford wharf twice a week. Sold on in the 1860s, it operated in the China/ Japan trade.

The replica *William IV* is currently having its deck replaced, which is an ideal time to get a clearer view of its workings. Understandably, the public isn't admitted on the ship for safety reasons. However, we were permitted aboard as Bill did the design work to install a diesel engine some years ago. This was necessary because the steam boiler had worn out, and the phenomenal expense of providing a replacement forced an alternative method of propulsion to be found. Fortunately, the steam engine remains in place and can still be made operational.

Bob and I, with our marine engineering experience, were fascinated with the double expansion, dual-acting rocking beam steam engine. Most people know what a normal petrol car engine looks like, basically a small box with all the moving parts hidden inside, doing around 6,000 revolutions per minute. This steam engine is hundreds of times bigger, with most of the moving parts working at a slow 60 rpm in clear view. At the bottom of a petrol engine is the crankshaft; however, this steam engine's crankshaft had to be on top, directly linked to the center of the paddle wheels, requiring a complicated arrangement of double-acting rocking beams. I am in awe of those who, over 200 years ago, conceived and designed this complex machinery and of the tradesmen who hand-built it without all the modern machine tools, lathes, mills, etc.

Currently Bill has commenced a 1.4m long model of the ship, while I am exploring the possibility of getting the *William IV* replica visiting its old Brisbane Water home, 185 years after the original one did.
